n January, the Choptank Trust received a grant application from Diakonia Inc., a Worcester County nonprofit organization that provides comprehensive services for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. The application sought funding to purchase heavy duty, twin-sized waterproof mattresses equipped with bedbug infiltration prevention technology. The Choptank Trust proudly contributed \$5,000, enabling Diakonia to purchase around 24 mattresses.

Incorporated in 1987, Diakonia Inc. is dedicated to helping reinforce and rebuild critical foundations for those at risk of (or have already become) homeless. Over the past year, Diakonia has helped and sheltered around 275 people.

Help for Today and Hope for Tomorrow Choptank Trust gives back to the community

The facility includes 20 male beds, 20 female beds and 15 family beds. Diakonia also works closely with the Department of Veterans Affairs to offer rehabilitation services to veterans in need. On average, the facility holds 50 to 60 people who are at risk or have already become homeless.

The average length of stay for a resident in Diakonia is about 90 days. "The discharge plan begins on day one," says Diakonia Inc. Executive Director Ken Argot. Diakonia provides people in need with housing applications, employment opportunities, mental health appointments and substance abuse treatment to assist people with getting back on their feet. Diakonia will provide housing assistance that includes security deposits, application fees and finding landlords willing to forgo background checks. As a result, 65% of people who come through Diakonia find housing in the community. "Our staff are heroes," says Argot. "They ensure everyone



is individualized, making plans for every person's unique situation and giving them the encouragement they need to move on."

Diakonia is preparing to build "the 611 project," which will consist of an administrative/ veterans center, food pantry, thrift store and 42 affordable rental units. These new units will offer transitional housing options for residents preparing to reenter independent living. "We are always looking for solutions where the gaps are," adds Argot.

"I cannot say thank you enough for what they've done for the community, what they continue to do and how they are growing," says Jackie Brown, Worcester County Trust Board member, regarding Diakonia.

he Oaks Waterfront Hotel in Royal Oak is a staple wedding and destination venue on Maryland's Eastern Shore. However, if you haven't had the chance to visit lately, there have been a lot of changes. Co-owners Scott and Tracy Wagner invested millions of dollars in renovation to the historic property, ranging from a new lobby ballroom, four newly constructed cottages, suite upgrades and a new restaurant and bar.

Dating back to the early 1900s, The Oaks promotes its history as one of the last silent films, 'The First Kiss,' was filmed in the area. Fast forward to 2025, The Oaks is a buzzing place for weddings, conference attendees and the public during the week for food and drinks. This is not the first time The Oaks has seen major renovations. Twenty years ago, the large ballroom and dock were added to the property.

"We saw what it could be," said Andy Warner, General Manager at The Oaks. "It was beautiful, but it needed love, vision and a serious investment." That investment turned into a full-scale revival — gutting the original structure, adding four elegant cottages and meticulously redesigning every inch of the property.

Since 2022, Wagner and his team have been investing in the local community and partnering with local artists, photographers and musicians. The Oaks Waterfront Hotel recently won the Talbot County Economic Development and Tourism Department's 2025 Community Impact Award. This award highlighted the high-quality guest services and investment made into the property. "We would like to congratulate Scott and his team for this achievement and their vision of bringing various community features together," shared Mike Malandro, President and CEO of Choptank Electric Cooperative. "As a member of our Cooperative, The Oaks shares

a similar mission to Choptank Electric by supporting its community and valuing its history as changes are made."

As everyone knows, the Eastern Shore of Maryland is a very special place. Highlighting the natural beauty is an economic driver. The Eastern Shore Economic Resiliency Toolkit states that tourism accounts for 17,392 direct jobs and over \$1 billion in total labor income. Venues like The Oaks bring together the rich history of the Eastern Shore and balance of work life.



The quality of life for our members and the community has always been at the center of what we do. Modeling the Cooperative Principle Concern for Community, Choptank Electric Cooperative adopted Operation Round Up® as our community assistance program in 2004.

Operated as the nonprofit Choptank Electric Trust Inc., Operation Round Up® is a simple and rewarding way for members to contribute funds for local charities, needy individuals and service organizations. The Choptank Electric Trust is governed by its own Board of Directors representing all nine counties on the Eastern Shore. Members who participate in this program "round up" their monthly electric bills to the nearest dollar and donate the difference to our program, distributing the money in our local communities. In 2024, 93% of Choptank Electric Cooperative members were enrolled in Operation Round Up®.

The Choptank Electric Trust also authorizes donations to support community programs and historical efforts. A total of \$326,548 was granted by the Trust in 2024 to support our community with food, clothing, shelter, equipment, medical and educational needs.

In the summer of 2024, the Trust donated \$2,500 to the Talbot Humane Society to upgrade their meet-and-greet room and support their mission. A meet-and-greet room is essential to a humane society as it allows the animal to meet potential adopters and their pets to ensure they go to the right home. Thanks to the Trust, many shelter animals will find their perfect family.




