

GIRL POWER ON THE EASTERN SHORE

onnecting more women with the energy utility sector has been an industry-wide goal over the past few years. One area of focus is centered around linework. While we continue to see more women take on roles in the field, attracting them to line crew roles remains a challenge.

To spark their interest in the beginning phases of career exploration, the electric cooperatives of Virginia, Maryland & Delaware host Girl Power, a one-day energy career experience for high school girls. This free program is open to any female student interested in or curious about working on a line crew, in a substation, with advanced-metering technology, as a fiber broadband technician or a variety of other careers in the power industry. These types of operations roles can often lead to a variety of leadership opportunities within an organization.

The Girl Power Eastern Shore event will be held on Oct. 2, 2025, at Choptank Electric's Training Center in Salisbury, Md. Instructors will lead participants through various outdoor activities and demonstrations with some classroom instruction and guest speakers. The program emphasizes safety on the job, including how to safely climb a utility pole and operate a bucket truck.



Students will also individually meet with industry human resources professionals to review their resumes and discuss interviewing best practices. Other representatives, including community college advisors, are on site and available to answer questions about career paths and education requirements.

Q&A with retiree Lance Lockerman

fter nearly four decades of service, Lance Lockerman is retiring from Choptank Electric Cooperative. In this conversation with Communications Specialist McKayla Kiernan, he reflects on the journey, the people and some lessons learned along the way.

Q: As you prepare to retire, what thoughts come to mind?

I want to begin by expressing my gratitude to everyone who has helped me reach this milestone. From the leaders who placed their trust in me, to the farmers who would pull my truck out across a muddy field so I could make a critical repair to restore power — every experience mattered. Every person I've had the privilege of working with and learning from has left a lasting impact.

Q: You've held a variety of roles at Choptank. How did those positions shape your leadership style over the years?

Each role came with its own lessons, and through them I gained a deeper understanding of the

challenges people face across the organization. I've always believed that good leaders create an environment where others can succeed. For me, that meant hiring the right people, giving them the tools and training they needed and trusting them to think for themselves. I was there to offer guidance when needed, but also wanted to give them the confidence to lead on their own.

Q: What were your main responsibilities as Vice President of Operations?

I was responsible for several critical areas of the cooperative. That included overseeing: line crews; contractors; safety, training and compliance; vegetation management; warehousing and supply chain; fleet services;

and facilities management. I was fortunate to work alongside dedicated professionals who brought their best every day.

Q: Looking back, what stands out as your favorite part of working for Choptank?

Without a doubt, it's the people. The bonds formed over the years — through day-to-day work and the challenges we've weathered together — have led to friendships that will last a lifetime. In my 39 years at Choptank, I've worked through ice storms, floods, hurricanes, tornados, and even a derecho, Each storm taught us something new.

Q: What advancements during your career made the biggest impact on operations and service?

Two major enhancements stand out. First, the integration of automation through fiber technology, which puts information at your fingertips and reduces drive times during outages. Second, the improvements in materials used for underground cable, which have significantly boosted reliability.

Q: What are you most looking forward to in retirement?

More time with family and some longer-term vacations. I've truly enjoyed my time at Choptank. It's been an honor to be part of the organization's story.



Fall Fest Grows with Fiber

JZ Farms celebrates its fifth season this fall

s the harvest moon nears, farms across the region open their fields to the community for fall festivals and activities. Nestled on 175 acres in Federalsburg, Md., JZ Farms welcomes guests of all ages to their annual Fall Fest. This year marks the fifth season for owners Jane and Zach Blough to host groups from across the nation on their family farm.

"We wanted to share the land that our family loves with our community and create a space for everyone to make memories outdoors," shared Zach.

What started as a few attractions for kids in 2021 has quickly grown into a full day and night experience with 20 fall-themed activities, including a 10-acre corn maze, Farmersville with 12 playhouses, a U-pick pumpkin patch, sunflowers and more.

As the excitement for Fall Fest grew in 2022 with more visitors, Jane and Zach saw the potential for making the event larger to serve additional people. With more guests came the need for more services and technology; and their current internet was not allowing them to expand or operate efficiently.

"We weren't sure how we were going to be able to continue with slow-to-no internet out at the farm." shared Jane. "It made ticketing transactions hard to complete and didn't provide the quality customer service that our family delivers."

At the close of the 2022 Fall Fest season, Jane and Zach were dreaming of additions to their farm and beginning to plan for the next year. Around that same time, Choptank Fiber obtained funding from grants through the state of Maryland and Caroline County to expand its broadband network to rural areas that were left unserved by other providers. In March of 2023, JZ Farms connected to Choptank Fiber and purchased the 450 Mbps Performance Package.

"It was perfect timing," added Zach. "We knew with Choptank Fiber, we could grow the event to its potential with an advanced ticketing system now that we had reliable high-speed internet. We have not had one issue since!"

JZ Farms now sells season tickets online, allowing visitors to scan their passes at the farm on iPads connected to the fiber network. They also accept credit cards and use the Square point-of-sale system, processing payments instantly for all parties upon admission. The Wi-Fi is also used in the main building for concessions and market transactions.

Jane added, "We don't have to worry about





transactions anymore and can spend our time focusing on the people and activities on the farm during Fall Fest."

In addition to Fall Fest, JZ Farms also hosts field trips, birthday parties, corporate event room rentals, live music and food trucks.


Aside from the agri-tourism business, Jane and Zach raise chickens for Coleman, grow strawberries, flowers and other produce, and lease farmland for corn and soybeans. The entire farm and family's home is on Choptank Electric Cooperative's lines,

benefitting from the affordable power as well as internet. Jane and Zach both grew up as Cooperative members in Caroline County and are proud to raise their own family with three children as part of the Choptank community.

Zach concludes, "We're grateful for the reliable power the Co-op provides to operate our farm and maintain the essential equipment that's responsible for keeping our chickens and produce alive."

eptember falls within the peak Atlantic hurricane season, which runs from June 1 to Nov. 30. This means that tropical storms and hurricanes are more likely to develop and potentially impact our members during this time.

Choptank Electric Cooperative crews are always prepared and standing by to respond should power outages occur in our area. When severe storms cause power disruptions, our line crews take all necessary precautions before they get to work on any downed lines.

In the event of a prolonged power outage, turn off major appliances, TVs, computers and other sensitive electronics. This will help avert damage from potential power surges and will also help prevent overloading circuits during power restoration. That said, do leave one light on so you will know when power is restored.

If you plan to use a portable generator, make sure it's

rated to handle the amount of power you will need, and always review the manufacturer's instructions to operate it safely.

Severe storms can occasionally bring down power lines. If you see a downed line, always assume it's energized and never approach it. If flooding occurs, never walk through areas where power lines could be submerged.

Follow us on Facebook for the latest power restoration updates. If you experience an outage, please don't report it on Facebook. Call our outage reporting number at 1-800-410-4790 or report your outage on your SmartHub app.. This is the fastest way to let us know if your power is out.

We hope the region avoids severe storms this hurricane season, but Mother Nature's plans are never certain. That's why the co-op recommends making a plan today — because storm preparedness is always the best defense.




